Joseph Haag, Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Examiners Larkin, Severn and King, appeared before the Park Board in connection with the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting of January 14, 1921, directing that a survey of various departments in connection with the prepara-tion of the Budget for 1922, be made.

Discussion between these gentlemen and the members of the Board continued until 4 P. M., at which time on motion the Board adjourned.

The speedway section of Ocean Parkway, between Bay Parkway and Kings Highway, is no longer restricted to the use of light harness driving and speeding purposes during any hour of the day, on any day of the week, but shall be open for the use of automobiles and other pleasure vehicles at all times, the same as other sections of the main roadway. 3. Change of Surface Construction. The speedway section of Ocean Parkway

is no longer restricted to speeding and light harness driving; and the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn is hereby authorized to regulate, grade, curb and pave this section of the Ocean Parkway main roadway, between Bay Parkway and Kings Highway, with a permanent or other suitable type of pavement for general automobile and pleasure vehicle use.

Commissioner Harman referred to the question of police protection for the parks, and asked for an expression from the other Commissioners as to the advisability of endeavoring to secure legislative action on the lines of the bills introduced at the last session of the Legislature on this subject.

Commissioner Hennessy suggested that the legislation might be somewhat easier to secure if it provided for park keepers instead of park police. The Secretary of the Board was directed to secure copies of the bill of last year,

and making the amendment as suggested, report it to the Board so that arrangements might be made for its introduction in Albany.

The Secretary was also directed to secure the renewal of the Mayor's approval or permission for this action.

On motion, at 3:55 p. m., the Board adjourned.

The Secretary read an opinion of the Corporation Counsel on the subject of the jurisdiction of the Park Board over projections beyond the building line within a distance of 350 feet from the outer boundaries of public parks, and the opinion was fully discussed in relation to the ordinances of the Park Department on that subject.

The letter contained the offer of eighteen band concerts to the City for its parks and public places by the Columbia Summer Concert Committee. It was accompanied with a tentative schedule of allotments of such concerts, and a memorandum from the Chamberlain containing suggestions for the schedules. The Secretary was directed to confer with the Chamberlain and request some

changes in the schedule to meet the wishes of the Park Commissioners.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Commissioners Gallatin, Harman, Benninger—3.

Commissioner Gallatin offered the following: Resolved, That the proposal of the lowest formal bidder for furnishing and delivering automobiles and motor trucks to the Department of Parks, Borough of Manhattan, received by the Board of Purchase on March 16, 1921, be returned to the Board of Purchase with this resolution of acceptance in order that the contract may be entered into under the provisions of chapter 320 of the Laws of 1919.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Commissioners Gallatin, Harman, Benninger—3. The Secretary presented a tabulated statement furnished by a Committee of Gardeners, showing comparison between the payment of Gardeners on the per annum basis and on the per diem basis.

It showed that the per annum figure would be \$175,310 and the per diem figure or amount allowed in the budget would be \$176,792.50.

This tabulated statement accompanied a letter of transmittal addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionmentt.

The Secretary understood that the Gardeners' Committee wished the Park Board to authorize them to send it.

Commissioners Harman and Benninger said that no further action of the Park Board was called for as favorable action in this direction had repeatedly been taken.

Commissioner Gallatin acquiesced in this view.

Commissioner Harman reported that the Bill authorizing the appointment and organization of park keepers had been introduced in the legislature, and was in order of Second Reading in the Senate. He read editorial and other utterances in its favor, and said there was no apparent opposition to it. He expected that it would speedily become a law.

The Secretary reported that the action of the Board of Purchase in the matter of the exemption of certain park supplies had not been made a record of the Board, and was directed that the notices of the proceedings should be printed in the Minutes as follows:

Your request of the 15th inst., asking for the exemption from purchase through the Board of Purchase of certain items required for the proper operation of the Park Departments, was presented to the Board to-day and decision was rendered granting such permission with reference to the following commodities:

Trees, shrubs, plants and sod. Also live animals for the menageries.

Your application for the exemption of seeds was not granted, it being understood that such requirements had been obtained through the Board of Purchase during the year 1920 without detriment to the proper conduct of the business of the Departments which you represent. It was, however, stated by the Chairman of the Board that should the Park Departments consider it was absolutely essential that exemption be granted with reference to seeds, that the matter could be again brought before the Board for discussion.

This endorsement is based on the result of actual experience in park administration and is given with a view to obtain that protection in the parks that is vitally necessary for their preservation and enjoyment. The vandalism and other gross misconduct that are now common in the public parks are not merely destructive of park property of all kinds, but they act to a large extent as a deterrent to thousands and thousands of people from having any use or enjoyment of the parks at all.

It is not simply a loss in dollars and cents that is to be considered in connection with the destruction of park property; but, unchecked vandalism and misconduct have a strong tendency to lead the offender, whether young or old, into a path of error otherwise.

Two of the large parks of the city have some regular police assigned to them, but the other parks, some of them in populous and even congested sections, have simply either nominal or no police protection whatever.

Our advocacy of a restoration of a park protective system to be wholly and exclu-sively under the direction of the Park Commissioners is no reflection either upon the Police Department or upon the personnel of the police force. It is simply a situation

Police Department or upon the personnel of the police force. It is simply a situation that has come as a legacy to the present administration, and the Police Department with its manifold duties otherwise is not responsible for it. Every large city in the United States has its own park police, and why not New York? The time is fast approaching when the city will have to take up the question of re-forestation, or else the spectacle will be witnessed of parks without trees. To attempt to plant trees now in the way of re-forestation, without adequate protection, would be willful waste of time and money.

Outside of willful destruction of park property, the misuse of the parks otherwise, by the casting of all kinds of refuse in them, costs the city at least \$200,000 a year, to pick up and dispose of.

This amount would be practically all saved eventually if the Park Commissioners had that control over the situation that a force of park keepers or park police would give them.

It would be just as reasonable to have the Police Commissioner a Park Commissioner as well as Police Commissioner as to expect the Park Commissioners to render the highest degree of service and at the same time deny them the power to enforce the authority that is vested in them to maintain and preserve the parks.

Sir :

I am in receipt of a communication from your Board, dated June 21, 1921, signed by Willis Holly, Secretary, Park Board, which reads as follows:

"I am directed to request your opinion as to the legality of action to reject the bid or proposal made pursuant to an advertisement and upon specifications under the following condition:

The work is to furnish all the labor and materials for repaving with heavy traffic asphalt on concrete foundation the main roadway of the Bronx and Pelham Parkway. The advertisement contains the usual provisions and refers bidders to the specifications in the usual terms.

Paragraph 12 of the specifications provides that 'the bidder must deposit with the Secretary of the Park Board, at or before the time of making his bid, samples, in suitable container of the following materials intended to be used, stamped with the name of the bidder and date of deposit, and properly labeled with the name or brand of the contents.' Samples referred to, to the number of five, are mentioned and an affidavit stating the location of the mines or wells from which the asphaltic materials will be supplied, is called for. The paragraph concludes, 'No bid will be considered formal unless the deposit of materials and the statement referred to is made within the time prescribed, nor unless these conform to the requirements of the specifications.⁴

The low bidder in this case presented only one of the five samples required. The question is whether this prevents the bid from being considered formal, and whether the contract can be awarded to the next higher bidder who conformed to these specifications in regard to the deposit of samples?" Paragraph 12 of the Proposal for Bids, provides as follows: "12. The bidder must deposit with the Secretary of the Park Board, at or

before the time of making his bid, samples, in suitable containers, of the following materials intended to be used, stamped with the name of the bidder and date of deposit, and properly labeled with the name or brand of the contents, viz.: (1) A sample of not less than two pounds of Refined Asphalt with a statement of its origin. (2) A sample of not less than two pounds of the liquid Asphalt Flux or Petroleum Residuum (no sample of flux in glass vessels will be received). (3) A sample of not less than two pounds of the Asphaltic Cement, with a statement of the formula used in its composition, all quantities being expressed in pounds. (4) A sample of the mineral aggregate. (5) Two (2) sample Asphalt Blocks, of the size and dimensions specified. The bidder must also deposit an affidavit stating the location of the mines or wells from which the asphaltic materials were obtained, and the method of refining and that nothing whatever has been added to the crude natural material. No bid will be considered formal unless the deposit of materials and the statement referred to is made within the time prescribed nor unless these conform to the requirements of the specifications."

The lowest bidder deposited only one of the five samples as required by the above paragraph and the amount of his bid was \$89,527.50.

The bid of the lowest formal bidder amounted to \$99,010.00.

In my opinion the Park Board may legally waive the irregularity of the lowest bidder and permit him at this time to file the other four samples as required by Paragraph 12 of the Proposal for Bids, and if the four additional samples are satisfactory to the Board it may then award this contract to the lowest bidder, or it may reject all bids and re-advertise or may if it deems it for the best interest of the City so to do declare the lowest bid defective, reject the same and award the contract to the lowest formal bidder.
