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PARK BOARD

Stated Meeting, Tuesday, January 8, 1929

Present—Commissioners Herrick (President), Hennessy, Browne, O'Rourke.

There being no bids to open, and the Commissioners being delayed at 90 Pine Street in a Conference with the members and officers of the Park Protective Association too late to return to the Board Room at 2:30 p. m., the meeting was called to order in a room of the Down Town Club.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous Meeting was dispensed with.

Commissioner Herrick offered the following:

Resolved, That the time stipulated for the completion of deliveries of forage on the Contract No. 90507 of Murphy Bros., for which bids were opened by the Board of Purchase August 2, 1928, be and the same hereby is extended for fifteen (15) days, the delay being due to reasons beyond the control of the Contractors.

Commissioner O'Rourke presented Mr. Charles Fremd, of the Rosebank, Staten Island Laboratories, as an expert who had achieved remarkable success in treating trees affected by disease, parasites and old age.

Mr. Fremd spoke briefly on the importance of concerted effort to prevent further encroachment upon park and private tree plantations and to conserve what remains of both. He explained that his private work provided amply for all his business interest in the subject and that he would be glad to consult in and assist with the park work as a matter of public spirit without any fee or charge.

He suggested that the Fremd Laboratories work in progress at the Moravian Cemetery, Staten Island, would be a valuable and interesting demonstration for the park authorities of all the Boroughs and invited a visit.

Commissioner O'Rourke said that he was familiar with the work referred to and was fully convinced that such an inspection would be to the great advantage of the park officials. He moved that Mr. Fremd's invitation be accepted and that the Secretary be directed to communicate with all the Commissioners and arrange a date that would be the most convenient to the greatest number. He suggested that the meeting be set for the Park Department offices, Borough Hall, Richmond, and said that he would provide automobiles for the rest of the trip.

Commissioner Herrick called the attention of the Commissioners to the action he had been obliged to take in connection with newsstand privileges in the parks to insure compliance with the provisions of the City Ordinance. These provisions applied only to the parks in the Borough of Manhattan, but he thought they would be of interest to the Commissioners of the other boroughs. He read the provisions, as follows:

"Chapter 17, Article 4, Section 66, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York."

"Paragraph 5. No newsstand adjoining a grass plot shall exceed in height the ordinary pipe rail fence of the Department of Parks against which stand is placed. All newsstands adjoining grass plots shall have their top covers fully removable. On such newsstands there shall be no display either above the level of the pipe rail fence or to the left or right of the stand adjoining the grass plots. Violations of this order will result in the cancellation of that portion of the permit allowing the sale of periodicals, and will restrict the offender in the future to the sale of daily publications only. No newsstand adjoining a grass plot shall exceed six feet in width.

Paragraph 6. Newsstands on park walks not adjoining grass plots shall not exceed ten feet in length, nor shall any such stand have a total width of more than three feet. In cases where the distance between the rear of such stands and the nearest curb line is less than ten feet, such stands shall not exceed two feet in width.

Paragraph 7. Stands not adjoining grass plots shall not exceed seven feet in height."

Commissioner Herrick said he had arranged for Architect Charles Schneider of the Department of Parks, Manhattan, to assist the newsstand holders in complying with these provisions.

There being no objection, the President directed that the reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting be dispensed with.

President Herrick announced that the regular order of business would be suspended to allow the representative of Health Commissioner Wynne to be heard without wasting his time.

Mr. Edward Fisher Brown, a Director of the Diphtheria Prevention Commission of the Department of Health, City of New York, appeared and explained that Commissioner Shirley W. Wynne, M.D., of the Department of Health, who had asked for a hearing before the Park Board, had found it impossible to attend and had designated him to represent the Health Department.

Mr. Brown said that the Health Department officials felt that those of the Park Department would naturally be interested with them in the campaign to wipe out diphtheria in this City. They realized the objections to the invasion of park territory and its use for any other than park purposes, but had carefully considered methods that would minimize these objections, be only temporary in their operation and be of vital importance in combatting what it has been proved is a preventable disease.

He asked the Park Commissioners to consider allowing the Health Department to erect tents in various parks about 20 x 20 feet in size, to be equipped with Doctors and Nurses and used as depots for the diphtheria prevention treatment of children. This treatment, he said, is by the injection of a serum, takes only about a minute, is painless and furnished lasting immunization.

Commissioner Herrick asked if the plans had been thought out in detail as to what parks were particularly suitable for the work, and discussed with Mr. Brown various small parks and locations.

It was decided that a survey should be made of the Manhattan Parks and their surroundings from the standpoint of this proposed use, and that the Park Department and Health Department officials should cooperate in making the survey.

Commissioner Browne said that Brooklyn's largest park, Prospect Park, had a newly erected building in which the work could probably be accommodated and that he would give permits for tents in other parks where he approved of them.

Commissioner Butler volunteered to handle the matter in the same way and Mr. Gross arranged with Br. Brown to meet Park Commissioner O'Rourke to make the same arrangement in Richmond.

Commissioner Hennessy expressed his interest and signified his intention to cooperate. He asked what representative of the Health Department would have charge of the work in the Bronx. Being told that Sanitary Superintendent Arthur J. O'Leary, M.D., was the official, the Commissioner said that he would take the matter up with him and do whatever could be done.

A general discussion was had on the question of use of property acquired for park purposes for playground activities. The question was raised by the following communication submitted by Commissioner Browne:

"MY DEAR PRESIDENT:

A situation has just developed in the Brooklyn Park Department which I think possibly may affect the Park Departments of the different boroughs, and I thought it would be well in connection with the same to ask the Park Board to consider the subject, as it is my purpose to address the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in regard to it.

It is the subject of the title of the acquisition proceedings for park and playground property. The Board of Estimate under the charter has authority for determining the purpose for which property is acquired, and it is customary for them to acquire it for park *or* playground purposes and not for park *and* playground purposes. Therefore the title established in the acquisition resolution actually prohibits, in the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, the construction of a playground in a park.

I am addressing the Board of Estimate asking that in the future the title of the acquisition resolution be made broader and more flexible, to the effect acquired "for general park and playground purposes" in all cases, so that there may be a way in the development design to permit of the fullest use of the premises by the general public and the fulfillment of existing neighborhood needs at the time of the improvement or preparation made in said design for obvious future requirements.

I am sending you herewith a copy of my proposed communication to the Board of Estimate on a particular case now before us; also a copy of a proposed communication to the Board, asking for a general change in all property acquisitions.

I would ask your consideration of these proposed communications to the Board, as I believe they will be of interest and affect all Park Departments in the different boroughs."

"GENTLEMEN:

In the acquisition of property by the City of New York through authority of your Board, a resolution is adopted in connection with the proceedings, I am informed by the Corporation Counsel, which sets forth the purposes, as provided by the Greater City Charter, for which the property is acquired, such as "for parks," "for playgrounds," etc., and according to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel under date of September 16, 1929, the property, in order to conform with said acquisition resolution, should be devoted strictly to the purposes so set forth.

I wish to call to your attention at this time in regard to such definite purpose resolutions that in a great number of cases the property, after being acquired, remains for a number of years in the condition it was at the time of acquisition before any funds are provided by your Board for its development, and that during said period, or even at the time the property is acquired, it is not to the greatest advantage of the City or the public at large to so limit the method of development, as over long periods of time between acquisition and development the environment of the neighborhood may entirely change or local conditions may urgently require that a section of a park be developed as a playground and that the land itself should be constructed possibly as entirely a park or a combined park and playground.

It is therefore very difficult to properly prepare suitable designs for such developments when their treatment is strictly limited to the title of the acquisition resolution, preventing its fullest development for public needs as determined by the administrative heads of the Park Departments of the five boroughs, as the conditions and requirements of each borough are different and vary in character.

I feel that it would be but proper that your Board should adopt in all such proceedings a broader and more flexible title so as to permit of the Park Departments in conjunction with the Landscape Architect, who prepares the design, developing a plan for improvement that would be fully comprehensive, adequate, and meet all of the needs evident at the time of the improvement as well as future needs which may then be obvious such as a title reading "for general park and playground purposes," and not otherwise limited.

I would ask your early consideration of such an amendment to the customary resolutions which may be hereafter adopted in acquiring real property for Park Department uses.

This communication is actuated by a condition which has just developed wherein a piece of property acquired for a park is now highly desirable as a combined park and playground and would be unsuitable in the opinion of the City Landscape Architect and the Brooklyn Park administration for development solely as a park. Your Board is being addressed separately on this particular subject.

Your early and favorable action on such change in the purposes of the acquisition title is requested."

"GENTLEMEN:

This Department has under its jurisdiction a plot of land located on Bay Parkway, Avenue P. and West 12th Street, Borough of Brooklyn, and in the early part of this year your Board appropriated \$60,000 for its development. As is usual in proceedings of this kind, a survey and maps of existing conditions were made and furnished to our Landscape Architect, who prepared a design for the work. In the preparation of the design considerable consideration was given to the type of development and it was found as a result of same, after a number of conferences in this department with various Bureau heads familiar with the work, the Landscape Architect, and representatives of associations in the neighborhood, that the land should be developed as a combined park and playground; that is, a new method of construction, which has received general public approval. As a park alone, this would be inadvisable, as it is located in a neighborhood where there are no playgrounds and the children would, as they have heretofore done in all similar locations, destroy the lawns, shrubbery, trees, etc., in their play activities, owing to the fact that no regulation playground, where they may expend their energies, was provided. It was therefore decided to allow a certain area of this improvement for playground purposes. This was done in the design without in the least interfering with the park features of the layout—that is, walks, fences, lawn areas, trees, shrubbery and floral plantations, which were also taken care of.

It later developed, however, that your Board, under the power vested by the Charter of the Greater City of New York, adopted a resolution under which the purposes for the acquisition of the land were determined and titled in the acquisition proceedings "for park purposes," the word "playground" not being mentioned therein.

I addressed the Corporation Counsel on the subject and was informed that owing to such resolution defining the purpose of the acquisition, it would be improper for me to construct the combination park and playground, although it is the proper thing to do and the efficient method of providing the funds for the development.

My purpose in addressing you, therefore, is to request that under the provisions of the Charter empowering your Board to define the purposes for which the said property was acquired, you amend the acquisition resolution by making the same read "for park and playground purposes" instead of "for park purposes" only. The opinion of the Corporation Counsel in this matter was rendered under date of September 16, 1929, in reply to our communication dated April 10, 1929.

I would ask your early and favorable action on this request in order that the improvement, which we are not ready to start, can be gotten under way without delay and the premises opened for public use, which is urgently desired by residents of the neighborhood, as soon as possible."

At 3:30 p. m., the matter was laid over and the Board adjourned.

Hon. Nathan Straus, Jr., opened the Conference on the introduction of Hon. Walter R. Herrick, President of the Park Board, with the explanation that the purpose was to discuss extended park activities, with emphasis on additional park areas for recreational purposes and to further cooperation with the State Council of Parks and the civic organizations that are devoted to park activities.

Mr. Straus, while awaiting Chairman Robert Moses of the State Council of Parks, ran over the programme of subjects of joint interest in the City and State. On the arrival of Mr. Moses he was requested to preside and continued the presentation of the schedule of subjects. SIR:

I am in receipt of your communication dated December 3, 1929, which reads as follows:

On Tuesday, Nov. 26th, 1929, bids were opened by the Park Board, City of New York, furnishing of all materials necessary or required for surfacing the bottom of the pond in Bowne Park, Borough of Queens.

The work called for one item—seventy-three hundred and fifty square yards of gravel surfacing six (6) inches in thickness—and the bid was a price for furnishing and spreading gravel as specified per square yard.

The low bidder was Tony Di Roma of 10 West Fordham Road, Bronx, at twenty cents per square yard, amounting to fourteen hundred and seventy dollars, as shown on the tabulation sheet. Mr. Di Roma evidently miscalculated, as set forth in the accompanying affidavit.

It is necessary to expedite this work as Bowne Park is one of the skating centers of Flushing. The pond is at present practically dry as no water has been

turned into it since the recent completion of the new rubble stone shore walls and as the bottom of the pond is below the sewer outlet the gravel surfacing should be placed before flooding, otherwise the pond will have to be pumped dry again in order to place the surfacing on the bottom, which would be reflected in a higher price per square yard for the work.

I am anxious to hurry this work along and in view of the foregoing facts and the little time left before the skating season I would like to avoid re-advertising. Your opinion as to the advisability of awarding the work to the next lowest bidder will be greatly appreciated.

In reply thereto I hereby advise you that if from the facts set forth in the affidavit of Tony Di Roma sworn to on December 2d, 1929, and the prices bid by the other eight bidders for said contract, which prices range from Forty-nine cents bid per square yard by Peace Bros., Inc., to ninety cents per square yard bid by Welsh Bros. Contracting Co., Inc., the Park Board is of the opinion that Tony Di Roma made an honest mistake due to miscalculation and that the next lowest price bid of forty-nine cents per square yard is reasonable, the Park Board may permit Tony Di Roma to withdraw his bid and award contract to the next lowest bidder, or the Board may reject all bids and re-advertise for bids. The advisability of taking either action must be determined by the Park Board. The affidavit submitted by Tony Di Roma should be filed in the office of the Comptroller.
